# **STATUS OF THE MILL CREEK IN 2015** Dr. Michael C. Miller—Aquatic Ecologist

The Mill Creek runs for 28 miles from Butler County to the Ohio River, right down the center of the Cincinnati metro area. The stream has been abused from its earliest days until the passage of the Clean Water Act in 1972. For the last couple of decades, the Mill Creek has been targeted for cleanup and restoration by a number of different agencies and organizations, working on a number of issues, including reducing untreated

sewage; restoring the stream channel and riparian vegetation; and developing streamside bike/hike trails. Collectively they are trying to make the Mill Creek an asset to Greater Cincinnati and the 28 communities that it drains. Mike Miller has been intensively involved in Mill Creek issues and will update us on its status, focusing particularly on the biology and chemistry involved.



Dr. Michael C. Miller, Emeritus **Professor Biological Sciences** and Center for Environmental Studies at the University of Cincinnati, has participated in research on aquatic ecosystem structure and function for 40 years in the rivers and lakes in

S.W. Ohio, 29 years on lakes and rivers in the Alaskan Arctic, for 10 years on lakes in Ecuador and the Galapagos, with research expeditions to Eastern and Western Arctic Russia, Mexico, Kiratiba and Brazil.

He has trained 45 graduate students, written over 55 scientific articles and book chapters, and was continuously funded for 30 years. In the past 9 years he has turned his attention and effort to public service, receiving the award of Distinguished Professor for Public Service from the

University of Cincinnati in 2001 and the Fremont Lifetime Achievement Award from Rivers Unlimited in 2009. His research has examined the role of nutrients and primary production in lakes and rivers, the paleoecological reconstruction of climate and vegetation from cores of lake sediments, including recent investigations of el Niño events in the Galapagos and Kiritiba in the Pacific and sites across Ecuador and Brazil on the Equator. Many applied projects included cooling water impacts of coal-fired power plants,

#### "THE 2015 TOXIC ALGAE BLOOM IN THE OHIO RIVER: POSSIBLE CAUSES" **Dr. Miriam Steinitz-Kannan**

Professor Mirriam Kannan will talk about Algae Issues in the Ohio River Basin with a focus on toxic algae. She will start with a general overview of what are algae and their taxonomic diversity, showing

photographs of the most common taxa found around here. Dr. Kannan will focus on the recent toxic algae blooms on the Ohio River and what the causes are.

Dr. Miriam Steinitz-Kannan, is Regents Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences at Northern Kentucky University. She is a native of Quito, Ecuador. She obtained her Ph.D. at The Ohio State University (OSU) in 1979, working on a comparative study of Ecuadorian lakes. Her M.S. degree is also from OSU and B.A.(Biology) from Rider University in Lawrenceville, N.J.. She was trained by two world renowned phycologists in

Uranium concentration in fish below Fernald Nuclear facility, macroinvertebrate response to Prudhoe crude oil spills in ponds, a lake, and streams, including under ice. He and 4 other investigators (Marshall U, NKU, Thomas More C.) have undertaken Ohio River Runs of 981 miles of the river in a snapshot of river chemistry and biology in early August from 2001-2007.

As an Emeritus Professor, he has been active in numerous nonprofit organizations in outreach, education and assessment of water quality in S.W. Ohio, including helping to establish a water quality monitoring network by volunteers at the UC Center for Field Studies.

algae identification and ecology: trained in diatom taxonomy at the Academy of Natural Sciences of Philadelphia by Dr. Ruth Patrick, and in soft algae and cyanobacteria by the late Dr. Clarence Taft at OSU. She has been at Northern Kentucky University since 1979 where she teaches a variety of classes including Limnology (study of inland aquatic ecosystems) and General Microbiology. She offers yearly workshops on Algae taxonomy for the community. She is the faculty advisor for the Biology Honor Society (Beta Beta Beta). Her research interests focus on algae as water quality indicators, diatom taxonomy, paleolimnology (using fossil diatoms to reconstruct climatic histories), and tropical limnology. Her research

involves undergraduate students and is done in lakes and rivers of her native country of Ecuador and the Ohio River Basin. Since 2001, in close cooperation with ORSANCO and the EPA, she has been monitoring algae in the Ohio River Basin for taste and odor and toxin producing species. Her outreach activities are in large part directed to the Latino Community in the Greater Cincinnati Area. She is also very active in environmental issues, and works closely with the Foundation for Ohio River Education, the Ohio River Foundation and the Ohio River Basin Consortium for Research and Education to educate K-12 students about water quality and the importance of conserving water resources.










# December's Inning: Forks Over Knives

# Sierra Club Opposes the Removal of Cowan Lake's 10 Horsepower Restriction

Date: December 16, 2015

On behalf of the more than 4000 members in Southwest Ohio, the Miami Group of the Sierra Club opposes the removal of Cowan Lake's 10 Horsepower Restriction. Another dangerous lake in this area is not needed. Nor is the higher horsepower generated damage to shoreline. Or the unwelcome & intruding noise of motors.

The Sierra Club has long used Cowan Lake as a flat water venue for our paddle sports program which includes Canoeing, Sea Kayak, Recreational Kayak and Stand Up Paddle Board. The near absence of an upset risk from waves is much appreciated by students with little or no paddling experience. We instructors also appreciate this lower risk.

The Sierra Club leads trips on the lake. Safety is highly important, as is the experience of paddling in a lovely setting. Why badly damage this unique place? Why destroy the charm, the gentle sounds of water lapping, the movement of birds and the quiet sounds of the large number of people who are using non-powered water craft free from roaring boats?

Contrast this with the dangers found on Caesar Creek Lake and East Fork Lake - large waves and high potential of collision with fast motor boats. There are plenty of lakes in Ohio that have high horsepower limits.

Please preserve this treasure.

Finally a BIG thank you to the many folks who came early to set up and those who stayed late to help clean up. We hope you'll all join us again next November for this annual dinner.










# Miami Group Holiday Party
